Since the OSRT Annual Meeting, committees have been formed, and charges for committees have been delegated. Committees will focus on having regular virtual meetings to allow all members to participate, thus, allowing for different perspectives on how best to achieve the committee charges for 2022-2023. Committee charges include offering at least three continuing education credits via remote sessions bi-annually, the continued/increased presence of social media highlighting the efforts of OSRT, and strategies for increasing OSRT membership. The Governance and House of Delegates Meeting include the installation of the incoming ASRT officers for the upcoming 2022-2023 year. OSRT member Dr. Heather Moore was installed as Vice-President on the ASRT Board of Directors.

HAPPY SUMMER!!!

I hope everyone finds time in their busy schedules to enjoy this summer weather. I know I am enjoying time in my gardens and my pool. I thought it would be fun to interview a few RTs and report on it this month. I chose a recent graduate Alisha Eckman, R.T.(R) working full-time in a hospital and a veteran technologist of 20 years, Kristi Driscoll, R.T. (R)(M) working in an outpatient facility. I found their experiences and advice quite insightful, and I hope you do too!

When did you graduate from x-ray school?

Alisha: December 2021

Kristi: 2003

Did you have a job when you graduated?

Alisha: Yes, I was a Tech Assistant at one of my clinical sights before graduating. When I passed the registry, I was offered a full-time position.

Kristi: Yes, I was offered a job as GXMO (General X-Ray Machine Operator) during my senior year. This helped me tremendously in preparing to be a full-time RT.

When starting as a new RT, what was one of the biggest lessons you learned and why?

Alisha: You don't need to rush through exams; not everything will be textbook. Be flexible and get comfortable being uncomfortable, meaning you will have challenging exams where you will need to think outside the box to get the x-ray, but remember to breathe and always HAVE FUN!

Kristi: Once you graduate, pass the registry and start working, you are on your own. I remember relying A LOT on what I learned in clinical and as a GXMO. I didn't have anyone holding my hand like when I was a student. I worked with a handful of classmates, and we truly leaned on each other and helped each other learn on the job. We did help each other gain confidence.

If you could go back and give yourself one piece of advice, either as a student or a brand new RT, what would it be?

Alisha: As a student, don't be too anxious during exams and at clinical. Think through what you are doing and what the expected outcome is. Don't rush; there is no time limit (except for the registry:)). Also, I wish I had taken a two-week break after passing my registry before starting my new job; the mental break would have been nice.

Kristi: Don't try to be a superhero. Ask for help: lifting, unique positioning, etc. You will burn out, so pace yourself; you have your whole career in front of you. Breathe.

What advice do you have for students today?

Alisha: Again, don't rush through exams at school or exams at clinical. Don't take things so seriously, have FUN and ask questions.

Kristi: Take advantage of your clinical time, do as much as possible, and learn as much as possible (bone density, surgery, fluoroscopy, trauma, etc.). And TECHNIQUE, practice, practice, practice. But most of all, HAVE FUN & LAUGH.

As a student headed into my senior year, I advise new students to work hard and put the study time in as it will help you once you start clinicals. When you get overwhelmed, take a breath, walk away for a few minutes, regroup and get back at it. Remind yourself that you have chosen a remarkable career and that the sky is the limit.

One last friendly reminder....now that it's summer and hot weather is here don't forget to take your dosimeters inside with you and not leave them in your car.

STUDYING IN SESSION

Hi! I'm Lisa, a second-year student up here in Northeast Ohio - go, Guardians! I joined the medical field back in high school! I ended up attending a vocational school with a medical program during my junior and senior years. The school had a medical program during my junior and senior years, giving me a good head start in college. Throughout my senior year, I shadowed a few hospitals and began to get a feel for things. I temporarily worked in a nursing home between graduation and college. I became fascinated with radiology, its science, and the technology used to obtain different images. I love seeing the inner workings and finer details, so seeing anatomy and how our bodies work (or break!) under certain circumstances was neat! I think one of the nicer yet unsaid parts of clinical is that you begin to learn where your niche is. While I don't enjoy fluoroscopy, I love going to OR, and I could easily spend a day there. I love being able to watch the surgery in the meantime before they ask for images. Many people begin to find where they're comfortable and where they even excel. Some people prefer fluoro, and that's great! I learned that with exams, you begin to know where you gain speed and where you need to improve, and that's the significant part: you're learning as you go.

In terms of advice, there are a few points I'd encourage any student to know:

KNOW YOUR LIMITS WHEN STUDYING.

This could be something as simple as learning what kind of environment you study best in. Back in high school, I was able to blast music and cram myself in a corner, under a pile of notes. Over time, I realized I enjoy a quiet, calm environment with some music in the background and only 1-2 books in front of me. If the weather is nice, go sit outside!



Traffic Light Studying

Go through your notes, and highlight:

- Green means that you can easily recall and don't need to review. Read this only 1-2 times.
- Yellow means that you can recall it but with some trouble or miss a detail.
 Read this 3-4 times.
- Red means that you can't recall or have no idea what it is. Study these first, and read through these in between the green and yellow topics.

I know it's easy to do, but if you're at the point where everything looks the same, close the book and take a break. Stretch, get a snack and get your body moving. Taking 15-minute breaks between chapters works!



Find Study Buddies!

Your classmates are one of your best study tools! Having a group chat with our class and having study sessions in-person or online was great during exams. Getting together a few times before each exam and going over the material together not only reinforced the material, but it added new details you might have missed the first time around.



You're a student, and you're learning. Ask as many questions as you need until you understand it. We won't learn if we don't ask! Ask for positioning tips, ask how to identify anatomy easier on images, ask to practice with a tech or other classmates.

One of the biggest pitfalls of being in the medical field is how easy it is to fall behind on taking care of your health. Be sure to know when to step back and SELF-CARE take care of yourself. Now during COVID, it's easier said than done, but even small self-care habits throughout the week will pay off. Overworking yourself is easy, but trying to bounce back from doing so is twice as hard. Take those power naps, enjoy your coffee, and get enough sleep! Your body will thank you in the long run.



What I look forward to the most is no longer doing homework and catching up on all the missed sleep. In all seriousness, I can't wait to go up to OR and do surgery cases and take my mammography registry. Knowing I can help someone out makes all of the late nights worthwhile. Remember why you joined, and think of something each day that reinforces it. You can do it!
