On November 12-13, 1938, fortyeight x-ray technicians met in Lima, Ohio and signed an Affiliation Charter of the American Society of X-ray Technicians. These signatures officially formed the Ohio Society of X-ray Technicians, now formally recognized as the Ohio Society of Radiologic Technologists (OSRT). That same year, the first Annual Meeting of the OSXT was held. Since then, elections of officers and board members have been held at each annual meeting. Beginning at its inception, annual meetings have been held by OSRT every year with the exception of the war years of 1943, 1944, and 1945.

## **PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT 1**

#### KENT STATE UNIVERSITY ASHTABULA RADIOLOGY STUDENTS

This past year, the radiology students at Kent State Ashtabula participated in an Interdisciplinary campus activity called Flash University Medical Center. High school students throughout the various school districts register to attend a one-day hands-on experience highlighting the healthcare-related fields. These high school students learn how to assess and treat a patient following an accident. The radiology students are active participants demonstrating their skills in patient assessment, as well as treatment and instruction in performing the radiographic examinations.
