I approached a young girl for assistance, and when she saw my radiography shirt, she began to ask questions about where I was from and about my job. As it turned out, she was applying to a Radiation Therapy school in England, they have a long four-year waiting list.

This conversation prompted me to think about healthcare in England, which led to a web search for Radiography schools. During my search, I found they like to refer to us collectively as technicians (OUCH!). Once I digested that terminology, I also discovered they require a bachelor's degree. I found this line of thinking interesting, since nationally we have been debating the impact of an associate's degree, within the House of Delegates at the ASRT meeting for the last several years. Next, I did a job search and found out there are plenty of jobs for radiographers in London and Scotland. It may take 4-6 months to meet the requirements necessary to get your visa and proper credentials to work, but you may be able to work as a radiographer in England.

I realize the job market is slow right now, but I have been a radiographer for over twenty years and have seen this trend before, and it always gets better with time. Please keep in mind to just be diligent in your job search and something will become available soon. You may have



to look outside your local town but hopefully, not as far as England.

A Time to CARE and Celebrate the CARE BILL

Technologists from across the country are preparing to celebrate National Radiologic Technology Week. This year, more than ever, there is another reason to unite all medical imaging professionals, the CARE Bill.

With all of the recent heated debates over health care reform, now is the best possible time to rally around the bill put forth by fellow technologists. Advocating medical imaging is one way to show support for the bill and this year it was the OSRT organization that propelled **Ohio** into the national spotlight earning the prestigious ASRT National Grass-Roots Award. A few of the notable activities conducted by OSRT members included writing letters to government officials and visiting the capital city of D.C. to gain support from their representatives (a 2-day advocacy event known as R.T. in D.C.).

It is important to note last year marked the tenth year the **CARE Bill** has been circulating in Congress and in December 2008 the 110th Congress adjourned without taking any further action on the bill. So whether you plan on simply writing your state representatives or attending R.T. in D.C., it is important to act now while the timing is right. Don't let your elected officials discuss health care reform without adoption of the CARE Bill and federal minimum standards for all medical imaging
