Tech Talk by Lizzy Hemme, BRST, RT (R) (CT)

What is your name, educational background, credentials, and job title? *Maureen McDaniel, M.Ed., RDMS, RDCS, RVT 1 received an AS degree in Medical Sonography from Kettering College of Medical Arts, a BS degree in Health Professions from Kettering College of Medical Arts, and a Master's in Education from the University of Rio Grande. I am registered in Abdomen and Small Parts, Obstetrics and Gynecology, Adult Cardiac, and Vascular through the, American Registry of Diagnostic Medical Sonography (ARDMS). I am currently an adjunct Assistant Professor with the University of Cincinnati as well as a practicing Sonographer. I am employed at Associates in Women's Health and both pregnancy centers, I work independently and if I see anything that is concerning to me, I contact the physician.*

What does your job entail? I introduce myself to the patient and family members appreciating the fact that during an OB exam, it is typically a family affair. I explain the procedure to the patient and begin scanning the patient while I am documenting all the anatomy.

Why did this type of work interest you? *I am very privileged to be able to show the baby to its parents on an image. The scan itself is such a bonding experience for the parent, as well as a very technical exam for the physician.*

How many hours do you work in a typical week? This varies so much from week to week for me. Many of the courses I teach are distance learning in nature. This means that some weeks, I am working weekends, late nights, etc. and other weeks are not as time intensive for me. Some days, I am working from home completely; other days I am going to numerous sites, driving many miles and being on the road for a 14 hour day.

What do you think the most important skills and abilities are for this position? You have to genuinely LIKE people to be a sonographer. You have to be understanding of difficult situations to work in pregnancy centers. My life, with all the struggles that came with it, has allowed me to develop the personal skills I needed. Being able to talk to the patients about anything while focusing on technicalities like measurements, etc. is very helpful. You must LOVE to continue learning. I always say that I will keep scanning as long as I keep learning....I have so much more to learn.

Describe a satisfying or meaningful experience that you have had during your career. A really rewarding experience that happened last year was a previous student approached me at a national ultrasound conference and asked speak at our Ohio meeting. She had spoken as a student in a competition we held, but now she had graduated, become employed as a sonographer, and was ready to present as an expert. I was so excited because this organization was meant to bring new sonographers to a level of becoming the next generation of leaders in our field. I knew we had succeeded in our mission at that point!

What changes do you see occurring in this field during the next few years? For many years, we have been trying to move forward as a profession to allow for a mid-level provider, I believe this will eventually happen within our field. The technology is constantly changing allowing for more opportunity in testing more than we do currently. Cordless transducers are just now seeing the light of day; this advancement is will be a great asset to scanning! We also have new technology in breast ultrasound allowing us to scan the entire breast and look at it in slices similar to a CT. There are exciting times ahead in ultrasound!

Where would you like to see yourself in five years? *I LOVE where I am professionally at this point. I really like that every day is different for me: working from home on classes one day, scanning all day the next, and actively participating in our national and state organizations. If things are pretty much the same in 5 years, I will be very blessed.*

What suggestions do you have for an individual wishing to enter this field? You must realize that there are a lot of things that can go wrong with a pregnancy. People always want to think that scanning babies is so much fun, but you must appreciate that there will be tears. I am very blessed with how my career has blossomed.

Describe your membership in professional clubs, associations or organizations? *I am the Executive Director of the Ohio Medical Ultrasound Society. I also am on the Conference Management Committee of the Society of Diagnostic Medical Sonography and serve on the Nominating Committee of the SDMS.*

What do professional organizations do for the profession? The OMUS was developed to provide premier education to our Ohio Students. It is a fabulous organization that has provided for a place to have all Ohio Sonography Students come together in one place. I have also represented the profession as a speaker during the OSRT Annual Meeting.



What kinds of hobbies and activities to you enjoy in your spare time? I love traveling particularly cruising. I also make my own soap with herbs from my garden. I find this a wonderfully relaxing expression—it's like baking without the calories.
