I am here today because of the unwavering support of so many—my colleagues, daughters, mentors, and students, so many of whom are sitting right in this very room. Their encouragement inspired me not only to join this organization but to commit myself to driving meaningful change within it.

I wanted feedback not just from myself as a board and active member, but to understand how the ORST is viewed from a broader perspective. As I began asking students what OSRT meant to them, one response stood out. A student shared, 'I've always had a drive and passion for wanting to learn more.' That phrase lingered with me—it perfectly encapsulates the spirit of curiosity and growth that OSRT inspires.

Over the past few years, I've had a disheartening realization that for many, being part of OSRT isn't viewed as the vibrant and fulfilling opportunity it truly can be. I started asking the question, "Why are people viewing this as a formality or requirement?" Another mentioned that hearing others' stories, seeing their drive, and witnessing their commitment has reshaped how they viewed the field. This profession is not just about capturing images—it's about capturing impact, precision, and purpose.
